The workshop will provide participants with:


- an overview of the proposal writing process,

- strategies for identifying funding opportunities and resources.

The workshop presenters will be Nathan Meier, Tisha Gilreath-Mullen, and Carrie Wiese from the Office of Proposal Development at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL). This team helps enhance the content, quality, and visual appeal of grant proposals UNL administrators, faculty and staff submit to external funding sources. They also guide multi-institutional, interdisciplinary teams through the proposal development process, frequently with million-dollar results. The Proposal Development Team has helped UNL faculty secure over \$240 million in competitive grant funding from federal agencies and private foundations.
